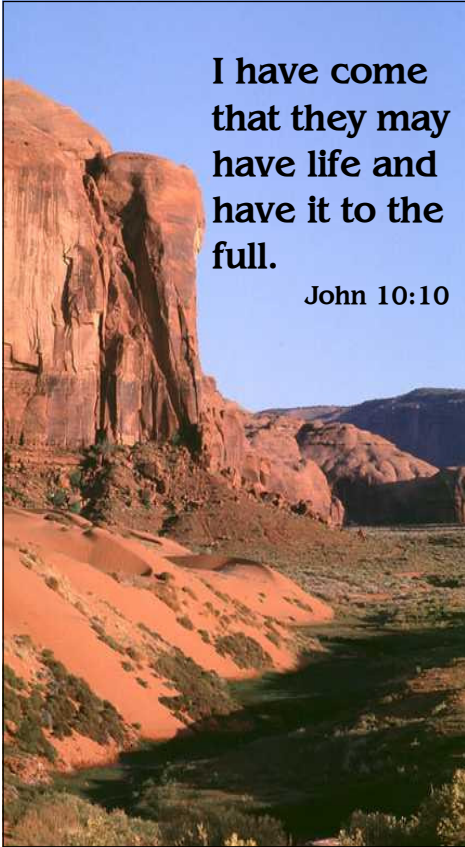

Hidden Treasure

In the year 1847 a woman died and left her nephew, Steven Marsh, her Bible. Part of her will read: "To my beloved nephew Steven Marsh I will bequeath my family Bible, and all it contains, with the residue of my estate after my funeral expenses and just and lawful debts are paid."

The estate amounted to a few hundred dollars, which did not last very long; and the nephew, for the next thirty-five years, just struggled along until he was able to obtain a small pension from the government. Somehow he never managed to do very well and mostly lived in poverty. He rarely even looked at the Bible, and he never opened it. All the rich and lovely words it contained he knew nothing about. Its big old brass clasps he did not bother to undo, though he knew of his aunt's love for it.

At last he was so poor that he had to move to his son's place; and while packing his few possessions, he opened the Bible. There, scattered throughout the Book were banknotes to the value of five thousand dollars. For thirty-five years the money had been idle, not earning interest, not helping anyone, but simply hidden.

There are many Christians who are finding the riches that are in the Bible. There are difficult parts—some passages may seem strange to us—but all of us may find passages full of wealth and beauty and strength, full of food that is good for our spirit just as the food we eat is good for our body.
